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
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Herb Jager 1928-2024

My name is Chloe Jager, and I'm Herb's daughter. You may know, from the history section of the SFFMC website, that "The club was reorganized by Herb Jager on a somewhat more formal level to assure its continuity and to allow it to promote concerts, benefit performances and other activities related to the community."

My father passed away on Friday, June 14th. He'd turned 96 in March. He had been living at the Veterans Home of California, Yountville since April of 2006. He'd taken a fall back in March and wound up in the acute care center of the hospital. Prior to that, he still made regular trips to see his son, who lived not far away.



Although Herb stepped away in 1962, leaving the amazing and legendary Faith to take over running the SFFMC, he did return and rejoin the

gatherings, eventually bringing us two kids with him to Friday nights at Faith's on Clayton Street. We were both pretty young so we didn't do much singing, but we do remember playing with other kids a couple of times. We moved around a lot (Herb could never stay anywhere long back in those days), so we didn't become regulars, but we never forgot. Herb did attend a gathering in honor of Faith after she passed. He never forgot her.

In addition to the SFFMC, Herb was an avid pool player. He would play in various bars throughout Northern California, for fun and in tournaments. He also loved riding his motorcycle, often going between San Francisco and Mendocino counties.

Herb had many jobs over the years. At one time he was a house painter, and before we kids were born, also spent time on the crews painting the Golden Gate Bridge and Sutro Tower. He was also a pot grower at various points in his life.

From 1965-1969, Herb owned a coffeehouse called the Blue Unicorn on Hayes Street. He also founded and owned an Indian vegetarian restaurant called Wellsprings Communion, which was part of the People's Food System, on Folsom at Langston in the mid-1970s. (He was eventually threatened and forced to move out by Earl Satcher, founder of Tribal Thumb.)

After that, we moved around in San Francisco and up in Mendocino County, sometimes living in a house, and sometimes in a converted school bus parked on private property, including on the lot an auto garage called The Tuning Fork on the corner of Potrero Avenue and 25th Street.

Herb continued to live in Mendocino and the North Bay until he moved into the Veterans Home. Around 2007, he met Mary at a friend's wedding, and they started dating. When they eventually married, Herb had to move off the compound, but after a year of marriage, they were able to move back together.

There was a service for Herb at the Veterans Home on July 18. He donated his body to Stanford for medical research.

He is survived by his wife Mary, daughter Chloe, and son Oshi.

Trad Lore 3: What Is a Child Ballad?

Francis Child brought together all the traditional English and Scottish story-songs he could find in print in the mid-1800s. Often his monumental five-volume collection is referred to simply as "Child," and the type of song it deals with as a "Child ballad".

For a song to survive for hundreds of years, a long chain of people must have invested the time to learn and sing it. They did that because the song moved them.

I'm what you might call a ballad geek. People are always asking me "Why do you even <u>like</u> those songs, they're so awful and depressing! And long!"

Ballads <u>are</u> long, it's true. They run about six minutes, on average. But if you think of hearing a ballad as being similar to hearing a friend telling you the essence of an exciting event in the neighborhood, six minutes isn't so very long. As to the sometimes violent or shocking content of traditional ballads, every surviving ballad — and some of them are hundreds of years old — is the boiled-down essence of something that mattered very much to a lot of people over time, even though we may have trouble relating to it today. If it had not mattered to singers and listeners, people would have stopped learning and singing the song after the freshness wore off, and it would have disappeared forever.

Remember, audio recording technology is a relatively recent thing, and songs were mostly passed "knee to knee" among singers, until printing became widespread and affordable. Even then, a printed song would leap off the page and start roaming around again as soon as some reader began to sing it and other people heard it. Think of oral transmission as a game of "Telephone", in which singers pass a song from one to the next. But in this case, the game may last for a hundred years, or three hundred, or longer. And participants will give their message to more than one person, so instead of a single chain the game starts to look like a

telephone tree. If any message at all is still identifiable at the end of such a process, a lot of people along the way must have made a great effort to preserve and transmit it.

One more point on ballad content: consider that murder is not necessarily the only topic, or the real topic, of a ballad about, say, a boy who murders his pregnant girlfriend. There are many reasons that people read horrifying headlines and watch movies on challenging topics like sexual assault and war and abusive families. Yes, some do so out of morbid curiosity, but there's also the drive to understand human behavior and make sense of one's environment, perhaps to apply lessons to one's own life. Like a well-conceived documentary, a ballad is a social document. The difference is that the ballad is much older, and for it to have survived as a data point, people must have invested the time to learn and sing it. I think they did that because the situation it described moved them to pity or wonder or empathy or recognition. These things still motivate ballad singers today.

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
Folklorists love to argue over the definition of the word "ballad". Most ballad scholars will, at a minimum, allow that a traditional ballad has these two characteristics:

- It's a narrative song. It tells a story, with characters, and a series of events leading to an ending. There are lots of great songs out there describing an attractive person, or a place, or a hard life. But they are not ballads unless they include a series of actions leading to a final event.
- 2. It has spent time in the oral tradition. We're talking about <u>traditional</u> ballads, and "traditional" is another fraught term. For our purposes, "traditional" means that the song was shared around among singers, over an extended period of time, in what's called "the oral tradition."

All songs were written by somebody, of course, but in the process of oral transmission, the name of the songmaker is often lost. (Not always, though. The Scottish poet Robert Burns comes to

mind. Some of his songs quickly entered the oral tradition and are still circulating that way, and attributed proudly to Burns, 225 years later.) But what makes songs "traditional" is that ordinary people, singing for one another, (as opposed to professional musicians like court minstrels, music hall performers, and recording artists) have picked up a song and passed it along to other singers like themselves.

Songs with a history of oral transmission are not somehow better than the product of professional musicians, but they are distinctive. When oral transmission goes on for generations, the song takes unforeseen paths which may be quite different from what the songmaker originally created. This evolution takes many forms: singers may forget the original tune and make up their own, or misunderstand a phrase and sing what they thought they heard; they may add a verse, recast a tale as a lullaby, or use the song's familiar frame-work and rhyming scheme to write a parody. What makes a song traditional is that, one after the other, successive singers learn and use the song in their own way. Using this definition, it isn't possible to write a traditional song. What makes a song traditional is what happens to it after it gets released into the wild.



People who spend a lot of time with traditional ballads can often detect when someone has taken a traditional ballad and "improved" it with

poetic language, moral lessons, and themes that are admired by the improver's contemporary audience. The result can be a beautiful song, worth singing and preserving, but until it proves it has legs, by surviving additional time spent in oral transmission, the "improved" version is no longer a "traditional" song.



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So, getting back to ballads: a traditional ballad is a narrative song that has been sloshing around in the waves of oral transmission for a while. In the process, traditional ballads tend to develop specific, recognizable characteristics.

- Ballads tend to avoid elaborate, consciously poetic language, not because the songmakers were "simple people" (at least some of them are known to have been well traveled and formally educated), but because songs that weren't written in simple language mostly didn't survive the process of oral transmission. They live only in print.
- Ballads are condensed. Events in a ballad start abruptly in the middle of the tale, without a lot of introduction. Nobody tells you who the bad guys are. You mostly learn about the characters by what they do and say, not from some omniscient narrator.
- Ballads are dispassionate. You have to make your own conclusions about good and evil when you hear a ballad.

People can do the most horrific or heroic things in these songs, but the older a song is, the less moralizing it offers about the characters' motivations or character traits. The guy lures the girl into the woods, kills her and buries her, and walks away. Or a husband becomes convinced his wife is cheating on him, and divorces her without a chance to defend herself. That's it, end of story. Who were these people? What were their relationships like? Were they abused as kids? In short, why did they do that? Just as in real life, you don't always know.


Some ballads leave you wanting to know what happened next. Did the bad guy get caught? Did the couple marry? As all storytellers know, the "end" of any story is an arbitrary thing — it ends where the author or journalist or storyteller decides to end it. You, the reader or listener, know life must have continued after the end of the story — the people went on to have other experiences, they learned, or failed to learn... but you'll never know about that, because the story ended. What came before and after those events must remain a mystery.

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So there you have it, the traditional ballad. That's the phenomenon that caught the attention of a brilliant Harvard professor, Francis James Child, in the mid-1800s. As often happens, he was doing something else at the time. Child was asked to edit the first few volumes of a projected 150-volume set called The British Poets. He had already written a foundational article about the language of Chaucer, as well as a six-volume collection of the works of the Renaissance poet Spenser (the Faerie Queen guy). After reviewing the resources at hand, he decided that traditional ballads, as rare examples of early anonymous poems in English, should be included in the British Poets collection. By the time he finished the editing job, the ballad research had taken on a life of its own, and soon he was working on the project that would occupy the rest of his life: The English and Scottish Popular Ballads.

This multivolume collection was so thorough, so deeply researched, the song relationships so astutely analyzed, and Child had situated the ballads so successfully in their broader European context, that even today, 150 years on, the work remains the key text for ballad scholarship. It's referred to simply as "Child," and the type of song it deals with is often called a "Child ballad".


Child set himself the task of gathering and consulting all the texts containing traditional ballads then known from England and Scotland. He worked his way through all the examples printed in books, then winkled precious and closely held old documents out of reluctant private collectors. He consulted every example he could find of hand-written manuscripts of songs, song-collectors' notebooks, and personal journals of singers. Child used his huge network of correspondents to discover songs in other languages that were part of the same story as his English and Scottish examples. All this work took place at a time when letters crossed the Atlantic in ships, the telephone had not been invented, and even the telegraph was something new.



Professor Child found that some songs, though differing in their text and often going by different titles, had so much in common that they seemed to share a common ancestor, to form a sort of song "family". To each of these families, he gave a single identifying number — the now-famous "Child number". Then he collected as many members of those families as he could find. He ended up with 305 numbers, most of them comprised of a dozen or more versions or variants. He added references to related songs in over 30 European languages. The

sheer meticulous scholarship of this process is breathtaking.

Child's work is more than a textbook, though. It is of interest to singers as well as researchers — an encyclopedia of potential singing material. The major weakness of Child's collection was that he was a scholar of English, not a musician. He took little interest in the tunes traditionally associated with the songs. This problem was remedied by a 20th century English professor, Bertrand Harris Bronson, at the University of California, Berkeley.



Bronson (who, like Child, had wide-ranging interests and was a Chaucer scholar) wrote a multivolume work called The Traditional Tunes of the Child Ballads. He had the advantage of living in the age of recorded music (though computers and digitized music were still to come), so in addition to the written scores available, he was able to consult, and often transcribed, material from the audio archives of Alan Lomax, Max Hunter, and others who had made recordings of ballad singers "in the field". Bronson identified, and analyzed from a musicological standpoint, many hundreds of tunes used for Child ballads. In the process he documented hundreds of additional sets of lyrics to the ballads. Bronson's work is an important extension of Child's, and the two books are the keystones of the balladlover's world.

The Colour Spectrum of Scales and Modes by Patience Young

Interested in learning more about music theory? I stumbled across an entertaining and informative series of free, on-line lectures provided through Gresham College in London, presented by a remarkably knowledgeable musicologist Milton Mermikides. (His lectures are rich, but he's no academic egghead; he speaks plain English.)

The lecture that first caught my attention was on "The Colour Spectrum of Scales and Modes"— using color to illustrate tonal relationships. It was/is fully illustrated, with at times dazzling animations, to convey visually and audibly the concepts he discusses. Whether you are a novice to music theory or have acquired some understanding of the fundamentals to tonal structure, this lecture will perk you right up to new insights on all sorts of musical genres; take in the delights of his fresh spin on modalities from Gregorian chant to various non-western systems to the theme for the X-Files. No matter that some of this may bewilder. If it really interests you, you can always re-view and pause to take notes. Each lecture runs about an hour.

Find this lecture – and much, much more! – by searching: Gresham College. Their offerings are broad, enlightening, and free. It's quite a service to lifelong learners.

July 4th Weekend Report

The weekend was held at Camp Herms from July 5th to July 7th, 2024. On Friday, we had 20 campers, 9 of them overnight. On Saturday, we had 68 campers, 10 of them overnight. On Sunday, we had 17 campers, 6 of them overnight (but we all went home Sunday night). In total, we had 80 individual campers (number tallied from Participant Waiver signatures).

We had a song circle in the Lodge Friday evening, rather than an open mic, which went until around midnight. Even though the heat was triple digits in much of the Bay Area it didn't get past the mid-80s at any time during the day. The Lodge stays cool, especially with the very effective ceiling fans.

Saturday was our most active day with 68 people registered, most for day use. On Saturday, we had a well-attended workshop (Danny Hirsch's Songs of Alan Sherman and Tom Lehrer) followed by a potluck attended by about 40 participants, then an open mic with 15 performers and a good-sized audience, and a campfire sing afterwards. Some people stayed in the Lodge for a second jam. Since there was high fire danger, we used the camp's propane fire ring instead of a wood fire. The temperature never went past the high 70s/low 80s and it was very comfortable.

Sunday was a much slower day, but we had some jamming, and Ed led a well-attended Songs of John Prine workshop. Late afternoon, someone stopped by from the Trackers program to let us know that a large group of Scouts and their parents would be coming in around 8:30 Monday morning. I was somewhat taken aback that this was the first we heard of this, since we are usually able to clean up at our leisure and leave sometime late Monday morning. Since almost everyone had left by this time, including all but four people who would have stayed to camp overnight, we cleaned up, the five of us who were left played some music in the Lodge for a while, and we left around 9:30. I believe Trackers are not there for our Labor Day camp, but I will be checking to see.

The camp cost us \$900 per day, for a total of \$2,700. We were short \$484.

I think we should continue to have the Memorial Day event at a Berkeley park, as the weather that weekend is often questionable, and we could lose a lot of money reserving the camp for that weekend. People had a good time at Cedar Rose Park, there was a lot of room to spread out, it only cost us \$140 for the entire two days, and we got about twice that in donations (which defrayed some of the loss from this camp).

We did meet our goal of \$2,700 last Labor Day and hopefully will do so this year as well.

We need to reach out to other groups such as the old timey groups and others to make sure they know about the camp and become part of our camp population. 2024 SF Free Festival Report

SFFMC's 2024 San Francisco Free Folk
Festival, held on July 13, was a success! This was our
second year in our new outdoor location in Golden
Gate Park, with festival performances in the historic
park bandshell and workshops at the same time in
the park's nearby "Music Concourse", a large open
area with trees that's between the DeYoung
Museum and the California Academy of Sciences.

Attendance was excellent, as it was at last year's festival. We again had around 400 people in the audience for some of the performances, far more than we had at our prior recent locations in school buildings. Those in attendance at this year's festival included many people who had not previously known about the festival or the folk club, as well as many returning attendees who regularly attend the festival. The festival was a financial success, with donations exceeding expenses by a significant amount.

The new location does come with challenges. Nearby paid parking is expensive, and for part of the day the garage was full and nearby traffic quite heavy. We also continued to have sound bleed issues into the workshop areas from the performance stage, as the modifications we made since last year to address this issue did not fully solve the problem. But we reached many people whom we did not reach at our prior locations, and they liked what they saw and heard. On balance, the members of the festival core team all feel that we should stay at this site, so that is our plan for next year. We have several ideas for new ways to address the sound bleed issue.



This fall *Singing for Justice* will premiere in the Bay Area, and you will be able to see it and hear Faith's voice singing on public television in 2025! Meantime, folk music clubs around the country are participating in our community screening program.

We are thrilled to announce that the <u>United Nations Association Film Festival</u> has selected *Singing for Justice* to screen in late October at Stanford University. How fitting that the 2024 festival theme is "Shared Humanity"! First Appalachian Music Filmed?

The Folk Revival Project calls this five-and-a-half-minute clip "The first ever film of Appalachian music (1928)". Click through to listen and watch:



I don't know if that claim is true – I suspect not. It's certainly not true of music that was recorded and commercially released. Music, not film. I think Charlie Poole's first recorded music was released in 1925. And in the summer of 1927, Ralph Peer did some recording of Appalachian music for the Victor Record Company. In the process of selecting performers and repertoire to record, Peer urged performers to keep out anything modern. His recordings included contributions from Jimmie Rodgers, Ernest Stoneman and his family, the Carter Family with their Victorian gospel style, protest/gospel singer-songwriter Blind Alfred Reed, Rev. Ernest Phipps of the Holiness Church, stark traditionalist B. F. Shelton, fiddler "El" Watson (the only known African American at the sessions) and other string band musicians, contemporary shapenote singers the Alcoa Quartet.

But the claim could be true as regards amateur musicians being recorded and filmed at home. It's clear to me that this recording was planned, not "caught" – notice the dialog at the beginning ("What time did Lyda say he and Myrtle is coming over here tonight?" is clearly rehearsed) and the unnatural way they're facing the camera. And obviously, the color was added later by the person who posted, according to the caption. Still, it's the earliest home-recorded film of Appalachian music I've ever seen, and the claim might be true.

Even though the audio quality is quite good, the accent is strong enough so that I can only decipher half of what's being said!

According to the Youtube caption, the video shows Bascom Lamar Lunsford and his band singing a song called "Doggett Gap" recorded in Ashville, North Carolina on October 7th, 1928. "Doggett Gap" is the name of a mountain pass in North Carolina, just 25 miles from Asheville. The musicians, from left to right, are Bascom Lunsford (fiddle/vocals), Myrtle Brooks (guitar), Lyda Brooks (banjo), and Gaither Robinson (banjo). The tune, "Doggett Gap" seems very similar to the more famous "Cumberland Gap", so it could simply be a variation of Cumberland Gap with an alternate title.

Also interesting, the video was filmed in the inaugural year of the Asheville Mountain Folk and Dance Festival, which continues to this day and is considered the first ever "folk festival".

Song Scope 2: Hard Times

In each Song Scope, Marlene will examine and discuss the historical background of a chosen song and, at the end, provide links so you can listen to various recordings online.

Background:

It was a bit tricky to track down the background of this song, because there are so many songs with the Phrase "Hard Times" in the title, and there's so much crossover in the examples given for why it's hard times. But I think I figured it out.

The song was first published, with sheet music and lyrics by C.S. Sussdorf, in 1843, as "Hard Times." Sussdorff may have been influenced by, or he may have adapted, a 30-stanza song that was printed by Leonard Deming, Boston: American Memory, Nineteenth-Century Song Sheets. But although I was able to read the 30 stanzas, the link given to the Library of Congress page was no longer valid, and I couldn't find it anywhere else. I also couldn't find out anything about C.S. Sussdorf. He may have been an Appalachian old-timer who wrote some songs, or he may have been better known than that, or he may have learned an earlier song in the oral tradition (maybe "Rigs of the Times" from England), modified it, and claimed writing credit.

A sea-going adaptation, written from the standpoint of a poor sailor, was been written by William James Emberly of Newfoundland in 1936.

That is likely the basis for the Holdstock & McLeod version below. And the Windborne version was adapted from a source recording of Lillie Steele in the Lomax collection of the Library of Congress (to which they added a few new lyrics).

Summation:

This is a song of comic complaint, listing a series of people who are out to cheat you in some way. They could be particular occupations (blacksmith, preacher, doctor) or age/gender (old men and old maids), all of whom will say one thing, but do another.

Lyrics:

As is true with many old songs, there have been many versions of the lyrics! Originally, I was going to compile, and print here, as many as I could find, but after working on that for a while, it became apparent just how much effort that would take, and how much repetition there would be. So I decided to provide only four sets of lyrics, which is plenty for you to be able to see how the song has evolved lyrically over the years, as people's experience has changed in terms of what constitutes hard times.



July Board Meeting Highlights

Mailchimp: Ellen spoke to a rep from Mailchimp who said the cost would be \$45/month. Charlie said there's a cheaper rate. The account can be set up via PayPal, but Daniel said if we use the debit card we should be able to pay the bill that way as we do other bills. The nonprofit discount is 15% if we can get it. Charlie will send Ellen a link explaining how to apply for the nonprofit discount. She would like to set it up with the Club email rather than her personal one. One can send about 10 emails a month with the less expensive account. Ellen will check out the link Charlie sent her.

Charlie moved that Ellen get a paid Mailchimp account at the best rate she can. Daniel seconded. Approved unanimously.

Taxes from fiscal year September 1, 2022, to August 31, 2023, have been e-filed. RRF-1 needs to be sent to the state by mail. Hali will get the information from David as she sends it every year.

Daniel: SFFMC cards were printed up. They will be available at the SF festival this coming weekend.

Camp Herms: We were short \$484. Camp was affected by several factors, including excessive heat (although the camp was not as hot as other places), other events happening this weekend, and some people's continuing fear of COVID. Saturday was the most successful day, with 69 people registered, most for day use. On Saturday we had a well-attended workshop (only one was scheduled) followed by a potluck attended by about 40 participants, then a well-attended open mic and a campfire sing afterwards. Since there was high fire

danger, we used the camp's propane fire ring instead of a wood fire.

12 people camped, though only 9 camped all three days. Hali thinks we should continue to have the Memorial Day event at a Berkeley park, as the weather that weekend is somewhat questionable, and we could lose a lot reserving the camp. A discussion ensued. We need to reach out to other groups – such as the old timey groups and others – to make sure they know about the camp. We will see what happens during Labor Day weekend. Hali will write up a full report in a few days.

SFFFF: Daniel reports that aside from last minute tasks, everything is ready to go.

Cyprian's: Ed reports that the next one will be the first time the old-time and Celtic group will be coming. Raymond, who will be leading that group, came from the new group of names provided by Daniel. Friday and Tuesday Zooms have dropped off 10-20 due to increasing live activities, but are still going well.

ECFFF: Hali reports that we have the second meeting of the committee this Thursday. Hali went to the Community Center and paid the entire amount due. Daniel found some flyers from last year and Hali will bring postcards to the SFFFF this weekend.

Camp Harmony: Charlie reported that the contract has been signed and the first payment has been made. Camp will go from Friday December 27, 2024, to January 1, 2025.

Spring Camp Harmony: Patience reported that it will be held the second weekend in March, but nothing else is happening at this point. This event will be on Zoom.
